

How To Enter

Step 2: Membership and Competition Level Verification

- Your class selection will be verified prior to confirmation of your show entry.
- Upon acceptance, you will receive an e-mail with your pre-filled class sign. This must be displayed at the start of your video



Step 3: Film and Upload Your Videos

- Read the video rules that come with your video sign package and follow them carefully
- If you do not already have one, create your YouTube channel and upload your videos.
- Once done, copy and paste the class description and video links on the <u>Video Submission Form</u> found on the show website.

Step 4: Judging and Results

- Your classes will be judged within 10 days after the video submission phase ends.
- All judge's decisions are final.
- Results will be posted the day following the judging period at the show website.
- Copies of your completed test sheets will be e-mailed to you.



- Payment: Entries must be completed online at <u>SpotlightHorseShows.com</u> with online entry form by the closing date.
- Payment is accepted through PayPal or credit card. All fees are in US dollars. You will also have the option to use a credit card or check when using PayPal.
- One show office entry fees allows the same horse and rider team to cross-enter divisions.
- Horse, rider, or class changes after the closing date are subject to a \$25 change fee.
- Late entries are subject to a \$25 late entry fee.
- Refunds: Entries canceled for any reason prior to the closing date will be refunded, minus the show office fee. <u>There are no refunds after the closing date</u>. In the event the competition is canceled, Total Entry Fees minus the office fee will be refunded. Thank you for understanding.

Video Rules

You may videotape your ride/drive as soon as you have your sign. Videos must be in focus. Remember, the judge can only score what they can see, so follow these guidelines carefully! Please see the information on MAAP.

IMPORTANT! Show Management will review all submissions to ensure adherence to the rules as stated below. If a test does not comply with the rules, Show Management will contact the exhibitor immediately via email, text, or phone. The exhibitor will have 48 hours to resubmit their test from the time of the notification. Please take all guidelines into consideration when preparing your test submissions.

Video Guidelines:

- Use arenas that are as close to regulation size as possible and be sure letters are set appropriately to be viewed by the judge. Cones with large letters on them and poles on the ground to delineate the corners are acceptable. Large letters taped on walls work as well. If a test allows for the use of either the large or small arena, you can show in either size.
- To ensure that only videos taped for this competition are used, videos of tests <u>must be</u> unedited from start to finish, including the sign and equipment check and bridle/bit drop. They must be one continuous recording with the horse and rider visible at all times. Bridle and saddle pad numbers are not allowed.
- Videos must be filmed in LANDSCAPE orientation.
- The natural background sound for the test must be audible. Tests with no sound will not be accepted.
- Only video links from YouTube will be accepted.
- The test must be videoed from behind C, where the judge would normally be seated. Try and set the camera 4-5' off the ground. It makes the geometry easier for the judge to see.
- Prior to beginning the test, a sign must be held up showing the show name, WDAA show recognition number (if applicable), date of the show, horse name, & riders name, class # and test. Remove the sign just before the ride begins. The videographer can hold the sign then move back to behind the camera or hold the sign in front of the camera at arm's length while also holding the camera. There must be no edits between when the sign is shown and the rider appears.
- Keep the horse & rider in frame, paying close attention to the near corners. On the far side, you will need to zoom in for clearer judging visibility. For ridden dressage, the horse and rider must be visible at all times through to the end of the equipment check.
- Make sure to keep the letters in the frame that are elements of the test being performed.

Equipment Check:

- As soon as the test is finished, the camera must slowly circle the horse and rider showing all equipment and attire, including spurs and whip if used. If the videographer is unable to enter the arena, at G the rider may turn the horse slowly, wait five seconds, then turn slowly to show the second side, and wait an additional 5 seconds to complete filming of the equipment.
- Show the entire horse, including the legs and feet. Zoom in for 3 seconds so the details of the spurs are visible.
- The rider then dismounts and shows that 2 fingers will fit under the cavesson (noseband) or bosal by the side of the horse's check.
- After putting 2 fingers under the cavesson or bosal the bridle and bit /bosal must be dropped so it can be evaluated. **Exceptional riders** are exempt from the bridle and bit/bosal dropping requirement and are not required to dismount.
- Hold the bridle still so the bit can clearly be seen (in focus and in frame) for a minimum count of five seconds. Zoom in so
 details can easily be seen. Make sure the judge can see all parts of the bridle, including bit and reins clearly. Do not to
 obscure the bit, curb strap, curb chain.
- A cavesson (noseband) must be shown to the camera, both inside and out. Demonstrate flexibility of the cavesson.
- Demonstrate that the curb strap or chain is flexible and is at least ½ inch wide.
- Bosal: If you are using a bosal, you must drop that as well. After you remove the bosal, show both sides of your horse's face, unobstructed, as well as the bosal. Demonstrate flexibility of the bosal.
- You are responsible for knowing the correct rules for tack, attire and equipment for Western Dressage. See USEF WD121-123 for additional information.
- <u>Apparel & Equipment Rules</u>: USEF equipment and apparel rules apply to the Western Dressage division.




The test pattern may be called (with the exception of freestyles), but Coaching during the test is not allowed EXCEPT for WDAA Exceptional Rider tests.


Arena Sizes for Ridden Dressage

For tests allowing for either size arena, you may use either one.

Be aware that some test call for only 1 size arena. In those cases, you must use that. Below are the dimensions needed for you to set up your arena at home.







In the LARGE arena:

• Place a mark on the long rail at the following distances from the corner:

M:	6m =	19.7'
R:	18m =	59.1'
B:	30m =	98.4'
P:	42m =	137.8'

- F: 54m = 177.2'
- Place your letters 2 feet from the rail as these marks
- Repeat on the other long side



• Place a mark on the long rail at the following distances from the corner:

- F: 34m = 111.5'
- Place your letters 2 feet from the rail as these marks
- Repeat on the other long side
- C is 10m (or 32.8') in on the short side. Place that letter 2' from the rail as well.

Amateur Status Declaration

To compete in Amateur classes in the Western Dressage Division, competitors are required to provide proof of Amateur status in one of three ways. Declaration can be made at

www.spotlighthorseshows.com

1. Submit a copy of amateur card from a recognized equestrian sports governing organization (USEF, AQHA, APHA etc.)

2. Attest that you are serving an internship for college credit through your respective accredited college program and have never held professional status.

3. Attest that you meet the qualifications below.

I attest that, after my 18th birthday, I have not:

- a) Accepted remuneration for riding, driving, showing, training, schooling, or conducting clinics or seminars.
- b) Accepted remuneration for giving riding or driving lessons, lessons in showmanship, instructions in equitation or horse training. (Persons acting as counselors at summer camps, who are not hired in the exclusive capacity of riding instructors, are excluded and persons giving instructions and training to the handicapped are also excluded).
- c) Accepted remuneration AND acted as an agent in the sale of a horse or pony or accepted a horse or pony on consignment for the purpose of sale or training that is not owned by me, my cohabitant, or family member, a farm/ranch/syndicate/partnership/corporation/business I, my cohabitant or family member controls.
- d) Accepted remuneration for the use of my name, photograph or other form of personal association as a horseman in connection with any advertisement or article to be sold.
- e) Accepted prize money in equitation or showmanship classes, except in amateur or owner classes.
- f) Advertised my professional services such as training or giving lessons by way of business cards, print ads, or internet. Exception: The writing of books or articles pertaining to horses.
- g) Accepted a token of appreciation, other than money, for riding, driving, or showing in hand in halter (tokens worth more than \$300 are considered remunerations)

Junior Status

Riders are eligible to compete as juniors if they are 17 years of age or less at the beginning of the 2022 competition year (December 1, 2021 – November 30, 2022).

Open Classes

Any horse or rider may enter an open class if a junior or Amateur class is not available for that test. Example: Musical Freestyles are Open classes where Juniors, Amateurs, and Professionals compete together.

Any rider with a Professional rating may not enter Junior or Amateur classes.

Amateur Status

If you are entering amateur classes, you must submit a WDAA DECLARATION OF AMATEUR STATUS form . Please read the form and provide needed documents accordingly. If you select option 1 (you possess an "ACTIVE" amateur card from USEF, AQHA, APHA or any other equestrian association), you must also submit a copy of the card. You may also select personal testament on the show office form.

If you are found to NOT be an amateur, you will forfeit your entries with no refund Junior Status: Riders are eligible to compete as juniors if they are 17 years of age or less at the beginning of the 2022 competition year (December 1, 2021 – November 30, 2022).

All Decisions Are Final

All decisions of equipment checkers, show secretary, and judges are final. There is no protest covenant at this non USEF licensed event.

Class Restrictions

- NEW RULE FOR INTRODUCTORY LEVEL ELIGIBILITY: To be eligible for Intro Level, a horse/rider combination must not have shown in a Western Dressage Test at Level 1 or above in the same competition year. This rule applies to all WDAA recognized shows. The competition year is December 1, 2021 November 30, 2022.
- Horses may be ridden by two riders. Each horse/rider combination requires a separate entry with all signatures and emergency contact. WD 102
- No horse may be ridden in the same class number more than once (even with a different rider) per WD 102.2
- Horse/rider combinations showing in walk/jog horsemanship classes are not eligible for other horsemanship classes or any test other than Introductory Level (Different horse/rider combinations are eligible for other rail classes and tests)
- Horses may only compete in levels that are adjacent with the same rider. For example, a horse may not be ridden in a basic level test and a level two test UNLESS with a different rider. WD 102.
- A horse may be ridden by a maximum of two riders. WD 102.

Therapeutic Rider Classes

Riders entered in these classes may not cross enter into other classes in the show. Participants must abide by all USEF regulations pertaining to attire, tack and equipment for the recognized show. Reference GR821 for additional information.

Attire and Equipment

USEF rules and guidelines will be used for attire and equipment. For more information please review the <u>USEF Western</u> <u>Dressage rules</u>. WD 120 121 122 123.

Other

Every class offered herein which is covered by the rules and specifications of the current rules and of the current USEF/WESTERN DRESSAGE rules will be judged in accordance therewith.

GUIDELINES FOR GAITED HORSES

There are a significant number of gaited horse breeds (about 30 in North America), all with gaits specific to their breed. In Western Dressage competition, the gaited horse will perform a saddle gait in place of the jog. The saddle gait selected should be the gait in which the horse is balanced and athletically comfortable performing. The saddle gait is a 4 beat lateral or diagonal gait, timely and evenly performed. The tempo, rhythm and foot falls of the gait they choose to show must not change throughout the test. The true four beat gait the horse performs, should be able to be ridden in a working, lengthened, free and collected manner as the Western Dressage test calls for.

All rules can be found in the USEF Rule Book under Western Dressage.

WD106 Saddle Gait

The saddle gait has a noticeable increase in cadence from the working walk. Excessive speed or slowness will be penalized.

- 1. In lieu of a jog, gaited horses perform gaits of various rhythms and footfalls. The gaited horse will perform a saddle gait in place of the jog.
- 2. The saddle gait may be either a lateral or diagonal gait, timely and consistently performed. The tempo, rhythm and foot falls of the gait the rider chooses to perform must not change throughout the test. The gait the horse performs, should be able to be ridden in a working, lengthened, free and collected manner as the Western Dressage test specifies.
- 3. The quality of the saddle gait is judged by general impression, i.e. the regularity and rhythm of the steps, the cadence and impulsion. This quality originates from the horse having a supple back and well engaged hind quarters, and the ability to maintain the same rhythm and natural balance in all variations of the saddle gait.
 - a. Collected Saddle Gait. The horse, remaining "on the bit", moves forward with the neck raised and arched and showing clear self-carriage. The head approaches the vertical position and a light contact is maintained with the mouth. The hocks are well-engaged and must maintain an energetic gliding impulsion, enabling the shoulders to move more freely. Although the horse's steps are shorter than in the other saddle gaits, elasticity and cadence are not lessened.
 - b. Working Saddle Gait. With an energetic, regular consistent rhythm; the horse must go forward with consistent and elastic steps. The back must be relaxed and the shoulders free, while there is an obvious push from the hindquarters. The hind legs actively glide under the horse. The horse must show proper balance and maintain light contact with the bit. The horse's nose must be on or slightly in front of the vertical.
 - c. Lengthening of Stride. This is a variation of the Working saddle gait; the horse covers more ground while maintaining the same tempo, consistent rhythm as in the Working saddle gait. Speeding up is a fault.
 - d. Free Saddle Gait. The Free saddle gait will show moderate lengthening of stride and frame compared to the Working saddle gait. Without hurrying, the horse goes forward with clearly lengthened steps, with impulsion from the hindquarters and uphill balance. The rider allows the horse to carry the head a little more in front of the vertical than at the Collected and the Working saddle gait. The horse's neck is "out", down and forward, with the nose slightly in front of the vertical, with a loose rein and the poll at approximately the same height as the wither (the neck is level). The steps should be consistent, the whole movement balanced and unconstrained, while maintaining a consistent rhythm.

FHANA's Performance Awards are designed to reward FHANA members who are excelling in their equestrian discipline. There are nine (9) FHANA Performance Awards: Ridden Dressage, Riding, Driving, Driven Dressage, Western Dressage, In-Hand, Youth Dressage, Youth Driving, and Youth Riding. In 2019 FHANA implemented performance awards at the regional level, which allows for 7 different winners in those 9 different disciplines. Each regional winner is recognized with an award during the FHANA Annual General Meeting, and the overall winner for each discipline will be the highest scoring regional winner and become a FHANA Champion for the year. The 9 Champions will have their names placed on their discipline's perpetual trophy that is currently displayed in the FHANA office.

SPORT PREDICATE TITLES Click this link for more information and forms

The Sport predicate can be awarded to mares, gelding, and stallions that achieve good results in competitive sport. Sport can only be earned based on results achieved at shows registered with the "United States Equestrian Federation [USEF], United States Dressage Federation [USDF], Equestrian Canada, American Driving Society [ADS], Koninklijke Nederlands Hippische Sportfederatie/Royal Dutch Equestrian Federation (KNHS), and Spotlight Horse Shows [SHS]. The scores registered with USEF, USDF, ADS, Equestrian Canada, KNHS, and SHS determine qualification for the Sport predicate.

Divisions included in this show are Dressage and Driven Dressage.

Dressage: Scores must be from a test Third Level or higher

Driven Dressage: Scores must be from a single horse FEI test or any single horse Advanced ADS test with a canter movement

Paint Alternative Competition Program (PAC)

Description

Through the Paint Alternative Competition Program (PAC), you can get recognition for accomplishments in competitive events or just spending time in the saddle. Your accomplishments can be recorded on your registered horse's official lifetime performance record through PAC.

Easy to Enroll

An APHA or AjPHA membership is required to enroll and participate in PAC. The horse owner must be a member to receive any awards from the association. Annual enrollment of the horse in PAC is required, even though you don't have to own the horse.

An exhibitor's report form must be submitted within 30 days of the event or a PAC Riding Log must be submitted monthly. Forms can be found on our website at

You have 90 days to make any corrections once the PAC information is posted.

Awards

- Certificate of Recognition: A minimum of 20 credits in any one approved category
- Certificate of Achievement: 60 or more credits in any one approved category
- to the top 5 horses who earn the most
- PAC Year-End awards are presented to the top 5 horses who earn the most
- credits in one category along with recognition in the Paint Horse Journal.
- Six PAC Top Five awards go to the top five horses earning credits in at least six different categories in both Open and Youth categories.
- The title of Six PAC Champion will be given to any horse that places first in at least six different categories on the PAC Leader's List in a single year.
- The PAC Versatility Champion will be awarded to a horse that has earned a PAC Certificate of Achievement award in five (5) different Open PAC categories.
- The PAC Youth Versatility Champion will be awarded to a horse that has earned a PAC Certificate of Achievement award in five (5) different Youth PAC categories.
